Why I do what I do – Tara Santarossa, welder

I'VE always liked doing handson things, all the tomboy things. I love any outdoorsy kind of work – I could never work in an office or something like that.

My interest in making things started at school (Mossman State High). When the time came to choose electives, I picked manufacturing woodwork and metal work. I just knew it would be something I would enjoy. We learned to make small things like tool boxes and bbq plates using competent weld joins. We learned the difference between pretty welds and structural. I won the Manufacturing Subject Award two years running.

When I left school I went to work on a cattle property out at Richmond. I had fun chasing cows while getting my Certificate in Beef and Agriculture. The work also involved a fair bit of welding, so I kept those skills up too.

When I moved back to the Mossman area to be with my boyfriend I had to find other work. I was doing seasonal work at the mills and when that dried up I went doorknocking for jobs. It was pretty quiet. I ended up asking Rick Quaid at Wonga Beach Welding if he had any work. Rick said he had heard that I had a good work ethic and offered me three weeks at the business. When the three weeks were up, Rick tried really hard to convince me to stay on and We learned the difference between pretty welds and structural. start an apprenticeship. He said he was impressed with my welding skills and that I had the potential to become really good.

I was a bit scared about the money side, but Jacinta from Apprenticeship Support Australia explained how it would work, how to get a loan for tools and also offered to help with anything else I needed to get me through. Mum and Dad said go for it!

Depending how good I get the apprenticeship will take three to four years. Wonga Beach Welding do a little bit of everything, which makes the work really interesting, but we specialise in sheds and houses – high-end jobs requiring structural steel. I've worked on boat trailers, camping trailers, roofs and walls.

My favourite project has been building a dog cage to go in the back of a ute. The end result was really nice. When I see it driving around I feel really good – I can say "I made that."

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Revegetation plan for Mirage foreshore

MORE than 2000 native plants will be established on the Four Mile Beach dunal foreshore over coming weeks.

The joint initiative between Council and the Sheraton Mirage Resort will remove coconut debris including fronds, nuts and seedlings, with the revegetation to provide screening of the resort from the beach as it establishes.

No mature coconuts or na-

tive species will be removed as part of the revegetation project.

Mayor Julia Leu said the project was an initiative of the 2015-16 Coconut Action Plan. "This location is part of an extremely delicate dunal envi-

ronment that is expected to thrive with the introduction of more than 2000 native foreshore plants," Mayor Leu said. "Coconut palms are an iconic species in the Douglas Shire and all mature plantings will be preserved but by removing the coconut debris it gives the new native vegetation an opportunity to establish itself in an environment it was intended for.

"Council appreciates the contribution of the Sheraton Mirage in this project which will revitalise an important stretch of our foreshore."
